# **Gathering Words**

Light and peace in Jesus Christ our hope. **Thanks be to God.**Blessed be God: Source of all being, eternal Word and Holy Spirit. **Blessed be God for ever.** 

### THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

#### The Psalm

The psalm of the day is said or chanted.

...Glory to You, Source of all being, eternal Word and Holy Spirit: as it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be, world without end, Amen.

**The Reading** A reading of the day is read.

### The Contemplative Sit

The Principles of Centering Prayer.

- 1. Choose a sacred word or a sacred breath as the symbol of your intention to consent to God's presence and action within.
- 2. Sitting comfortably and with eyes closed, settle briefly and silently introduce the sacred word as the symbol of your consent to God's presence and action within.
- 3. When engaged with your thoughts, return ever-so- gently to the sacred word. Thoughts include body sensations, feelings, images, and reflections.
- 4. At the end of the prayer period, remain in silence with eyes closed for a couple of minutes.

20 minutes of silence begins and ends with a bell. We bow toward each other.

## Affirmation of Faith: "Jesus" From "A Song of Faith" (United Church of Canada)

We sing of Jesus, a Palestinian Jew, born to a woman in poverty... He knew human joy and sorrow. So filled with the Holy Spirit was he that in him people experienced the presence of God among them. We sing praise to God incarnate.

Jesus preached and practised unconditional love—

love of God, love of neighbour, love of friend, love of enemy—

and he commanded his followers to love one another as he had loved them...

He was crucified. But death was not the last word.

God raised Jesus from death, turning sorrow into joy, despair into hope.

We sing of Jesus raised from the dead. We sing hallelujah.

By becoming flesh in Jesus, God makes all things new.

In Jesus' life, teaching, and self-offering, God empowers us to live in love.

In Jesus' crucifixion, God bears the sin, grief, and suffering of the world.

In Jesus' resurrection, God overcomes death.

Nothing separates us from the love of God.

The Risen Christ lives today, present to us and the source of our hope.

In response to who Jesus was and to all he did and taught,

to his life, death, and resurrection, and to his continuing presence with us through the Spirit, we celebrate him as the Word made flesh,

the one in whom God and humanity are perfectly joined,

the transformation of our lives, the Christ. Amen.

# **Collecting Prayers**

One of these, or another collecting prayer (collect) may be said:

Week of Epiphany: O God of light and peace, whose glory, shining in the child of Bethlehem, still draws the nations to yourself: dispel the darkness that shrouds our path, so that we may come to kneel before Christ in true worship, offer him our hearts and souls, and return from his presence to live as he has taught. **Amen.** 

Week of the Baptism of Christ: God, your voice moves over the waters. Immerse us in your grace, mark us with your image and raise us to live our baptismal vows empowered by the Holy Spirit and the example of Christ our Lord, in whose name we pray. **Amen.** 

Between the Baptism of Christ and Presentation: Perfect Light of revelation, as you shone in the life of Jesus, whose epiphany we celebrate, so shine in us and through us, that we may become beacons of truth and compassion, enlightening all creation with deeds of justice and mercy. **Amen.** 

Or O God, you spoke your word and revealed your good news in Jesus the Christ. Fill all creation with that word again, so that by proclaiming your joyful promises to all nations and singing of your glorious hope to all peoples, we may become one living body, your incarnate presence on the earth. **Amen.** 

*Presentation:* God of steadfast love, you sent your Son to be the light of the world, saving people everywhere from sin and death. As Anna gave thanks for the freedom he would bring and Simeon say in him the dawn of redemption, complete your purpose once made known in him. Make us vessels of his light, so that all the world may glory in the splendour of your peace. **Amen.** 

### The Lord's Prayer
